The Froyle Football hut is looking sad and unloved. So what should we do?


Basic refurbishment could cost £20,000 or more and there is no guarantee that there will be a football team to use it.


These two events are again being held on the same evening.


## Froyle Village Hall Solar Panels, or Photovoltaic Cells: one year on and FREE electricity.

During 2015 the panel on the Hall roof generated 4,184kwh of electricity. For this we earned £614 from the Feed-In-Tariff regime. We also saved about £180 by using some of this electricity in the Hall and so had to import less from the grid, as shown by the pretty picture below.

Overall, we believe we have benefitted by £800. Putting that into perspective, our annual electricity bill is usually between £700 and £800, so our electricity was ‘free’ in 2015! See the second picture.

The cost, about £10,000, was covered by Developer’s Contributions from Froyle Park but, if we had had to pay for it, the payback would be about 12 years. The original forecast was to benefit by £900/year but since then tariffs have fallen a bit and in practice we generate most power in the summer when the Hall is less used and so we can use less of our own electricity than typical installations.

(For the technically minded, our system operates at about 10% of maximum capacity as it’s quite often dark at night, we have shorter hours of daylight in the winter and sometimes the sky is overcast and it may even be raining – occasionally.)

## Medicine for the Soul



For an unputdownable read I can recommend "In Pale Battalions" by Robert Goddard. Both Robert (Bourne) and my sister, neither great readers of fiction, agree with me. The action ranges back and forth across the 20th century, and starts in the 1980s when a woman goes to France to find her father's name on the memorial to the dead of the Somme. She finds his name, but this only adds to her confusion as she knows for certain she is not illegitimate, but she was born a couple of years after her father's death. I've read the book three times because I can never remember the details, and the twists and turns continue right up to the last page. Prepare to waste a lot of time enjoyably.....

I really loved "A Month in the Country" by J L Carr, which I picked up in Waterstones because of its front cover, which is in the style of an old Shell Guide poster. It's about a shell-shocked soldier from London who goes in 1920 to a small village in north Yorkshire to uncover a mediaeval wall painting in the church. There's a slight mystery running through the story; everything happens a slow pace in the village, the August weather is perfect, the local people, at first very wary of this southerner, gradually warm to him, and the soldier slowly recovers in a world so different from what he has known. I enjoyed this book as it is well written (the author was a schoolmaster for much of his life), and totally unsentimental. It is a delightful little book, only 85 pages.

# News from The Froyle Archive

## The 1939 National Register



On September 3<sup>rd</sup> 1939 Lady Nancy Smiley recorded the arrival of “A” Squadron of the 12th Royal Lancers in the stable yard at Froyle House. They requisitioned the garages and stables for their armoured cars with the soldiers staying for about three weeks until going over to France with the British Expeditionary Force.

In December 1938 it had been announced in that, in the event of war, a National Register would be taken listing the personal details of every civilian in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. This Register was to be a critical tool in coordinating the war effort at home being used to issue identity cards, organise rationing and more.

On September 5<sup>th</sup> 1939, the National Registration Act received royal assent and Registrar General, Sir Sylvanus Vivian, announced that National Registration Day would be September 29<sup>th</sup>. Having issued forms to more than 41 million people, the enumerators were charged with the task of visiting every household in Great Britain and Northern Ireland to collect the names, addresses, marital statuses and other key details of every civilian in the country, issuing identity cards on the spot.

The 1939 Register represents one of the most important documents of 20<sup>th</sup> century Britain. The information it contains not only helped toward the war effort, it was also used in the founding of the NHS, and, as the 1931 census was destroyed during an air raid on London and the 1941 census was never taken, it is the last view of life in Britain that many of us be able to see. We have downloaded all the records available that refer to Froyle, and they are can be viewed at:-

The Register was updated until 1991, thus anyone who was born less than 100 years and a day ago but died prior to 1991 will have their record viewable.

## Froyle Wildlife - Walks & Talks - 2016 DAIRY DATES



### The River Wey illustrated talk Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> April Froyle Village Hall

This month we welcome Dr June Chatfield chairman of the Northern Wey Trust and local natural history expert. June will be giving an illustrated talk about the River Wey northern branch, including its passage through Froyle.

Do come along and find out more about our local river and its wildlife, all welcome.

#### Dragonflies

In March Dr Bill Wain gave us a fascinating insight into the world of dragonflies. We learnt about their habitats behaviour and needs amongst other things. 40 species of dragonfly and damselflies can be found breeding in the British Isles. Various freshwater habitats from lakes, rivers and canals to small boggy pools and garden ponds are used for egg-laying, individual species having their own preferences. Dragonflies are carnivorous as larvae and adults, the underwater larval stage typically lasts 2 years but it's the adults that catch the eye with their vibrant aerobatics, the latter can be seen on warm days from spring until autumn depending on the species and catch 1,000's of insects. At rest dragonflies (larger and more robust) hold their wings out at right angles to the body whereas damselflies (weaker flying) hold their wings over their back. Threats include rivers drying out, canalised rivers with no bank-side vegetation, boat traffic churning up silt and pollution from industry and agri-chemicals.

Garden ponds can aid these insects, make them shallow-edged and fish free with submerged and marginal plant life. Ideally include shrubs or hedge nearby to provide a sheltered area to rest. Bill removes excess vegetation in his pond around August/September, leaving it on the pond side for a day or two to allow any creatures to crawl back. Look out for Azure, Blue-tailed and Large Red Damselflies and Southern Hawker, Emperor, Broad-bodied Chaser and Common Darter dragonflies. If you want to photograph them try early in the day before they have warmed up (and fly off), otherwise note their favourite perch and wait nearby until they return, patience and stealth is useful!

Dragonflies are harmless to us (they have no sting)

Meanwhile Candlemas Day (the 2<sup>nd</sup>), where the occurrence of good or bad weather traditionally predicts the opposite for the next couple of months, was rather unexciting too – a bit dull and overcast so neither one thing or the other.

## **To Well and Back.**

This walk is approximately 6 miles long and takes just over 2 hours, or more depending on how long you stay in the pub.

It begins at the Duck Pond in Lower Froyle. Here you head north up Hussey's Lane climbing gently out of the village to the top of the hill which affords views over Bentley to Alice Holt Forest. There is a bench here if the hill has proved too much, but when you have caught your breath you continue along the track which gradually winds down to the Isnage Farm Road.

The next section is on the road and begins with a steep climb up to the T junction with the Well Road. If you want a shorter walk, turn left before the T junction, along the bridleway that leads through Hangers Hyle Copse where, in the spring, the bluebells smother the ground in a sea of colour.

If you are walking for a beer however, turn left at the T junction and follow the road into Well, passing Manor Farm on your way.

Arriving in Well, go straight over the cross roads to find the Chequers and a well earned pint under the grapevine at the front of the pub. Blankets are available if it is a chilly day, but a good pint helps fight off the cold and any aches and pains at the halfway point.

A couple of hours later, set off along the Long Sutton Road, but quickly dive off left into the hedge at the half hidden fingerpost pointing off across the fields. This section takes you to the rear of Lord Wandsworth's College, where you can hear the distant shouts of the cricket/rugby, depending on the season.

The next bit can be really muddy. The aptly named Frog Lane can be something of quagmire, particularly in the winter when it becomes the playground of 4 wheel drive enthusiasts. The track makes its way through woods and past Sheephouse Copse, to arrive at the road opposite the South Warnborough turn. Here, turn left up another steep climb, past Bumpers and their windmill at the top of the hill.

Reaching the junction with the Lower Froyle road, cross over at the pond and take the path across the field opposite, to drop down into the steep valley at Little Wood. Climbing the other side soon brings you to the Yarnhams track, which you follow east towards Saintbury Hill Farm, with views of Upper Froyle to the right as you walk along the ridge.

Just past the farm take either left or right paths to drop down into Upper or Lower Froyle, depending on your final destination.



# THE VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

***Dear all,***

This is a rare thing indeed - an April Vicar's letter with no mention of Easter. (Although I have now just paradoxically mentioned it!). Easter was pretty early this year and for those of you who may be unaware, it is calculated according to some rather complex ecclesiastical lunar tabulation - which pretty much follow the astronomical lunar calendar, but not quite - perhaps I could bore you with the details another time! Anyway, as I was saying, we have an unusually long Summer Term to look forward to this year, courtesy of a relatively early Easter. This means a long run in to Summer holidays (which will mean tired teachers and pupils by the time we get there!) and allows us as a church to have two sermon series before the August break.

Our first series is based around the Old Testament character of Abraham, the first of the Biblical Patriarchs. The second is a series on Paul's first pastoral letter to Timothy. Undergirding both series of talks is the importance, not so much of moral excellence, neither of status nor of personal history, but, of faith. "Without faith it is impossible to please God" explains the writer of Hebrews. It was faith that ensured Abraham's legacy and it is faith that Paul urges the young Timothy to fight for: "Fight the good fight of the faith".

Everyone has faith in something, such as a philosophy or a certain rationality or way of thinking or faith in someone - themselves, humanity or God. There's no such thing as a faithless person. So a key question we'll be asking ourselves, is why do we believe what we believe? If faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we cannot see, then why do I have faith that certain things are right or wrong, for example? On what is my faith, however it is expressed, built on? Human nature can lead us to hold on to strong opinions despite little reason for holding them. Our need for the safety of certainties in an age of great uncertainty can make us uncritical of our own presumptions and prejudice.

Abraham and Timothy were both commended for their faith - join us at one of our Sunday services as we explore why.




