Report on the Extraordinary Meeting of Froyle Parish Council (FPC) Tuesday 7 June 2016

1. Parish Council

We welcome Mrs Julie Southern as the new Parish Councillor.

2. Planning Matters

Froyle Park (“FP”)

The Extraordinary Meeting of the FPC was held to consider the continuing absence of a response to the FPC letter sent (on 28 March 2016) to EHDC advising, by QC’s opinion, that no planning permission was sought, nor has been given, for the operation of a wedding venue at Froyle Park (FP), and therefore is not authorised. At present Froyle Park has two planning applications (‘car park’ and ‘low frequency music levels’) waiting to be submitted to the EHDC planning committee. Both are objected to by FPC, and they had been listed for the Planning Committee to be held on 19 May, but since pulled pending response by EHDC to the FP letter.

At its meeting on 7 June the FPC became concerned that the two applications would go forward to Planning Committee on 16 June. Thus, on 8 June the FPC wrote to EHDC as follows:

- a. Asking when a reply to the letter of 28 March can be expected, and the reasons for the delay.
- b. Requesting sufficient time to consider the response (when it comes) prior to the car park application going to Planning Committee.
- c. Assurance that EHDC will provide sight of their legal advice for FPC review.
- d. If NJG (Froyle Park) is contributing to the EHDC legal advice, then FPC has sight of the NJG legal advice.

On 17 June, the FPC finally received a reply from Mr Nick Leach (EHDC Monitoring Officer and Solicitor) advising:

“On the information available to it the Council (EHDC) is not satisfied that the use of the hotel as a wedding venue has displaced the authorised hotel use. Therefore as matters stand the Council is not contemplating taking any steps under Part VII of the 1990 Act to further regulate the use of the land.”

The FPC will be reviewing its options and may take further advice.

Further, Mr Leach has advised that the planning applications for the ‘car park’ and ‘low frequency music levels’ previously pulled from Planning Committee meetings will now be considered at the Planning Committee on 7 July.

3. Continuing Disturbance

Residents in Upper Froyle have continued to complain, to EHDC and FPC, on the high music levels coming from the wedding venue that have been endured during May. One resident has written “... *It really does at times feel like a nightclub situated next to us...*”.

Despite discussions and agreements with FP management on how best to move forward, the measures taken (eg, gates to be locked at 9.00pm) are not working and there is not sufficient regard for residents.

4. Next Parish Council Meeting

The next PC meeting will be held on Monday 11 July.

SPEEDWATCH – moving out of 1st gear...

We have now conducted over a dozen sessions using the Speedwatch kit borrowed from the Alton Police and the evidence remains that up to one in four motorists exceed the 30 mph limit in various parts of the Village. We are therefore deciding on our next move, in which connection we have recently had a meeting with Ian Janes of the East Hants Traffic Management Department of Hampshire County Council. We are awaiting further comment from him as to what we can and cannot do but *possible* action could include:

- constructing wooden (not white) entrance gates to the Village
- erecting blue “not suitable for heavy traffic” signs
- a permanent but moveable Speed Indicator Display sign (or SID*)
- creating some very minor pinch-points
- tree-planting along the highway, and
- general decluttering of signage throughout the Village

However this is only a wish list and whatever we decide everything will have to be funded out of the Village’s own resources which are clearly limited. More updates after the summer but we are pleased to report things are moving along steadily....



The View from the Woods

The seasons seem to fly past. Strange to think that we are already past the summer solstice, without really having had a summer at all thus far. I hope it has changed by the time you read this. Still, the rain is certainly helping our cover crops grow, and the birds seem to be coping with it. What gamekeepers, like farmers, don't like is wet weather later in the summer which delays the harvest.



In the fields and hedgerows, birds have of course been nesting since April. As always, I am most grateful to everyone for keeping their dogs under control, so that ground and hedgerow nesting birds are disturbed as little as possible at this sensitive time of year for them.

Before long, a new generation of wildlife will be out and about, developing and testing their survival skills as they grow to maturity. This means that, come August, the pheasant poults will once again be testing the patience of drivers on the country roads! As always, I shall try to instil some road sense into the pheasants; as always, I shall fail. Again, I greatly appreciate how considerate most people always are.

In May Froyle Estate held a rifle target competition for charity, organised with the help of Savills. This attracted competitors from far and wide and was very successful – it raised £1240 for charity (more than double last year's total). Also in May, we held our annual clay pigeon competition between the beaters and the Guns. I don't need to tell you who won (again)... Even the complicated scoring system devised by the Guns (and the many re-counts which were required as a result) couldn't save the Guns from their usual defeat. I write this safe in the knowledge that David is not editing this month's magazine....

No more such frivolities now that the rearing season is in full swing, though... Finally, I wanted to mention one other event, back in April, which I was particularly enthusiastic about. As reported in the June magazine, two bluebell walks in Hawkins Wood were organised by Froyle Wildlife with kind permission of the Froyle Estate. I unfortunately was unable to go on them, but I very much enjoyed helping to arrange them; I hope we can look forward to other such events on Froyle Estate in the future – and that I shall be able to go along and learn something!

Enjoying the Wildlife of Froyle

We have lived in Froyle now for nearly 12 years, relatively new residents compared to many, but every day I am appreciative of how lucky we are to live here, with the countryside and wildlife on our doorstep. This was highlighted on a recent two mile dog walk around Lower Froyle.

It was a gloriously sunny morning. We left our resident house martins behind in the nests around our house. After their long journey back from Africa we are hoping they will be successfully breeding, to help keep up, and perhaps swell, their 'amber listed' population. Shortly afterwards we encountered a Red Kite, another 'amber listed' bird, magnificently gliding low over the houses and gardens. 'Amber list' includes species where there is falling populations or contracting ranges.

Whilst walking close to the quarry, Skylarks were in songflight, some so high in the air that they were barely visible. This is a relatively common occurrence here, but not typical generally for the UK now as Skylarks are on the 'red list' of endangered or vulnerable species. In the hedgerow we heard the 'little bit of bread and no cheese' song of a Yellow Hammer, another species on the red list.

A Roe deer doe was standing in the shade of a tree at the edge of a field behind long grass. Luckily the wind must have been in its favour as the dogs were unaware of it. It remained there just watching us, perhaps it had a kid nearby.

As usual we stopped to admire the view from the thoughtfully placed 'tree bench' at the top of Hussey's Lane. On returning down the lane, a Grass Snake slithered back into the vegetation at the edge of the track, having been disturbed from basking in the sun by our footsteps. A Blackcap sang its melodic song further down the track.

Coming across the Recreation Field, we admired the blooms of the 'Wildflower area'. Once back in our garden, the hedgehog droppings were evidence of a visitor or two the night before, presumably consuming the food that we put out for them each evening.

Whilst I appreciate this is by no means an exhaustive list of Froyle wildlife, I feel very fortunate to be able to experience the sorts of encounters mentioned above.

Inspire the children with nature this summer

Children are naturally curious. Take them outside and they are interested in their surroundings: “What is that creature?” “Where has it come from?” “Where does it live?” **This summer, go outside with your children and enjoy nature.**

There are no rules, and it can be done as and when suits you. Whilst you are on a walk, or even on a car journey, look at the flowers and trees you pass on the verges and hedgerows. Turn over a stone in the garden and see what minibeasts you find, stand outside quietly for a minute and listen, discovering that there is a lot more wildlife around you than you can initially see. You don't need to be an expert and knowing the names of every plant and animal isn't the most important thing, it's being able to observe and appreciate what is there. You can learn together and it's one of the few activities which you can do together with your children, regardless of their ages with everyone on a par. Along with good books (the Collins guides are a good starting point) there are now lots of fantastic apps for identifying flora and fauna (e.g Plantsnapp, leafsnapp, iPflanzen, iBird.)

Here is an achievable list of **‘Five things to do in Froyle this summer’**:

1. Visit the wildlife area on the recreation ground. What flowers can you see? Can you see any other creatures which might like the wildflower area?
2. Take part in the Big Butterfly Count (www.bigbutterflycount.org). Count the butterflies or moths which you see in your garden, a park or wood for 15 minutes between 15 July and 7 August.
3. Go bird watching. How many different types of bird can you see? Can you spot a non-migratory bird, eg blackbird, and a migratory bird, eg swallow (where might they have come from / go back to for the winter?) Can you see a bird of prey, eg Buzzard, Red Kite or Kestrel?
4. Do a bug hunt around the garden. Turn over stones and plant pots and see what is underneath. Can you identify any of the creatures you find?
5. Stay up late and go on a night walk. Look out for bats and listen for owls. (If you hear a classic ‘Twit twoo’ it will be a tawny owl as they are the owls which make this sound.)

Have fun with your children, grandchildren or even just yourselves (whatever your age) enjoying the natural environment around Froyle this summertime. And for the grown ups, please don't forget:

23 July: BEES - Walk & Talk - Meet at the Village Hall at 10am. We will be visiting the rec and nearby gardens. Please check the website, call 23520 or email walksandtalks@froylewildlife.co.uk if weather conditions look uncertain. It's helpful for us too to have an idea of numbers.

THE VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

Dear all,

I'm proud of you. One of the unexpected joys of being a parent is the expressed need of your children for affirmation. Even if unvoiced, one is aware of their longing to be approved by you, they want to know you are proud of them and of what they have achieved.

Thankfully telling our children how proud we are of them needn't be a difficult or complicated thing to do. It simply involves thinking hard through a whole lot of lovely memories - a deeply positive thing to do. But why don't we spend more time saying good things to those around us as well as our children? If we wait too long it might be too late.

In my work with those who are bereaved I have seen the anguish caused by words that were never said. So much better to tell someone how much they mean to us while we can.

That love is always there, the foundation on which I can build my life. It means that even when I mess up, as I frequently do, I can rely on my Father's love for me. Along the way I hope that there are also moments when I make him proud. I expect they would often be the unseen and small occasions when I manage to truly live in tune with his plans and as a channel for his grace.

I hope that my children know that I will always love them whatever they may do. But it is also fun to tell them that they make me proud to be their Dad. This doesn't just have to be for children, it could just as easily be any relative or a friend.
